Oyan received his medical technology degree from the Loma Linda University of California. Coupled with specialized courses from the University of California at Riverside and the San Bernardino Valley College, he eventually earned his masters' degree from the Asian Institute of Management in Makati, Philippines. He manages an Italian coffee espresso machine importing and distribution company, coffee flavoring, bakery ingredients for bread, confectionery and pastry.

He presently serves as Treasurer for the Sagip Kapatid Foundation, a Trustee of the Fernando-Rosa Bautista Foundation of the University of Baguio, a Host Parent of the Philippine Military Academy, a Member of the Baguio Association of Restaurants, SKAL Makati and the Hotel and Restaurant Association of Baguio. He previously served as a Past National President of the Association of Pilipinas Shell Dealers Inc., Board Member of the Baguio City Council for the Boy Scouts of the Philippines, Vice Chair of the Regional Advisory Group for the Philippine National Police for the Cordillera Region, Director of the Philippine National Red Cross Baguio and a Trustee of Brent International School Baguio. In 2018, he was chosen as an Outstanding Citizen of Baguio City.

In Rotary International, he presently serves as the Co-Chair for THE ONE Philippines Humanitarian Award and as Assistant Zone Promotions Chair for Zone 10A for the 2021 Taipei Rotary International Convention.

He previously served as the District Trainer for RI District 3790 for RY 2019 - 2020, the Vice Chairman for Promotions for the 2019 Manila Rotary Institute and 2020 Honolulu Rotary International Convention, Promotions Chair for RI Zone 10 for the 2019 Hamburg Rotary International Convention, Promotions Chair for RI Zones 7 and 8, Membership Project Lead for the country of Indonesia, Rotary International President's Representative for RI District 3360 in Thailand in 2019, Rotary International President's Representative to the District Conference of District 3870 in Valencia City, Bukidnon in RY 2016-2017 and a member of the Young PDG Ad Hoc committee advising the RI board in RY 2017-2018. He served as Promotions and Attendance Chair of the 2016 Presidential Conference on WASH. He was Regional Rotary Coordinator for Philippines and Indonesia covering Zone 7A for Rotary Years 2012 - 2015 after having served as Assistant Rotary Coordinator for RY 2011 - 2012.

He also served as the Rotary International President's Representative for the District Conference of District 3300 in Malaysia in 2013 and as Training Facilitator for the Governors-Elect Training Seminars in Zone Institutes, as Breakout Speaker during the Rotary International Conventions in Bangkok, Thailand in 2012 and Sydney, Australia in 2014, as Breakout Moderator in Brazil in 2015, and as Chief Guest of the Presidents-Elect Training Seminar of RI District 3201 in Coimbatore, India in 2013. He was the Executive Secretary for the Philippine Rotary Forum of the Philippine College of Rotary Governors in 2005. His Governorship for RY 2009-2010 was a result of years of service under the Rotary Club of Baguio Summer Capital (RCBSC) where he was inducted in 1999 and, eventually, became the Club President in RY 2004-2005. He is presently a Major Donor Level 2 of the Rotary Foundation. His home club, for its part, enjoys the distinction of being the First 100% PHF Club in District 3790.

May the blessings of the Lord shine upon you and your family with abundance, wellness, safety, peace and happiness with Mama Mary at your side.

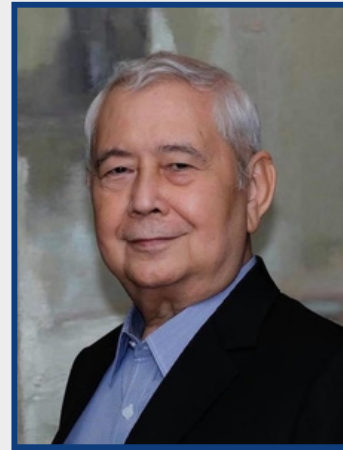
Let us extend a helping hand to those who are starving and malnourished. At times, it is no longer the struggle of the poor, but, their near end. The breadwinner of the family has long lost his job. They are indebted, sick and seriously in dire need. They need help.

We are appealing to all our members to donate to the Feeding Program Fund Drive. Our goal is for each member to donate 9,000 Pesos within the next 9 months. You may pay a one-time check or installments of Php 1,000.00 per month starting October 2020. In order to stretch our donation and make the program more sustainable, we will look for some corporations to co-sponsor with us. All funds will be deposited to the RCM Manila Foundation, Inc. Your Board will look for a reputable NGO to provide the food for the Feeding Program. Any comments or suggestions to improve this project would be appreciated.

It was very timely that we received a monetary donation of US \$3,000 from the Rotary Club of Osaka East and safety equipment from the Rotary Club of Shanghai which we donated to the Philippine General Hospital (PGH). As we are asking our sister clubs for help, they will likewise be seeking assistance from us. That is expected and we hope we can support other Rotary Clubs. Meanwhile, we will continuously help PGH in their cerebral palsy and cancer unit. It is the best hospital in the country to help the marginalized of society.

We are elated and deeply moved by the video presentation followed by the open forum regarding Fr. Rocky's TULOY Foundation. We were able to raise Php 140,000.00 as a start. We are committed to supporting TULOY all year round. We hope to be able to visit the TULOY Foundation when the pandemic subsides.

By the way, I just ended my term of duty as President and Commodore of the Manila Yacht Club (MYC) with flying colors for being the catalyst in Saving Manila Bay. MYC was



organized in 1923 wherein a number of the members were RCM members. I have requested to look into the archives to find out who were the officers and members of RCM and MYC. I have proposed to the new Board of MYC for us to have a mutual recognition of our past leaders. At present, we have RCM members who are also MYC members.

We have much to work for towards increasing our membership drive. I, personally, will be bringing in my 3rd sponsored member, who is my eldest son, and 4th sponsored member, another associate in social tourism promoting vegetables, honey and tree planting in Zambales in an Aeta Community. The Board members have committed to bringing in at least fifteen (15) new members this year.

We have reserved a maximum of ninety (90) guests in the biggest ballroom of The Heritage Hotel Manila for our Inaugural of the 2020-2021 Board of Directors and Executive Officers. Please join us in celebrating our new Board. This event will be fully sponsored by Philippine Wine Merchants. 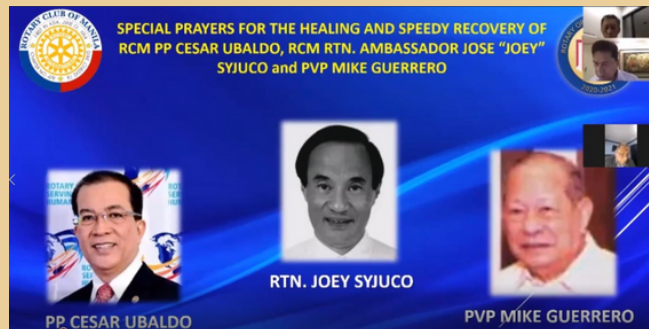

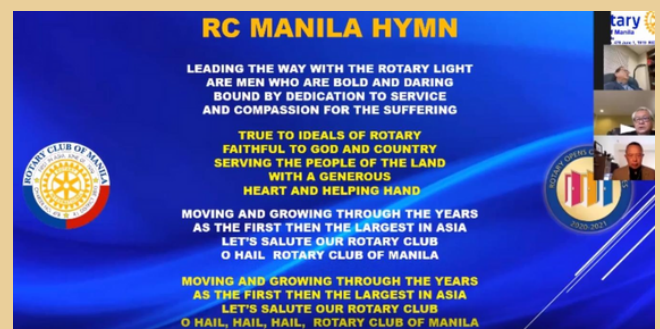

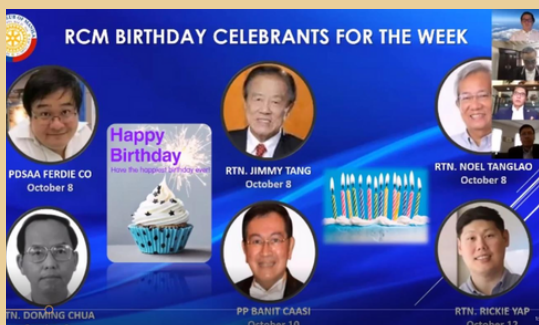

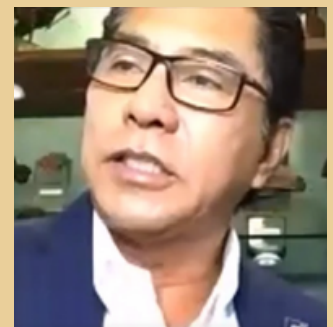

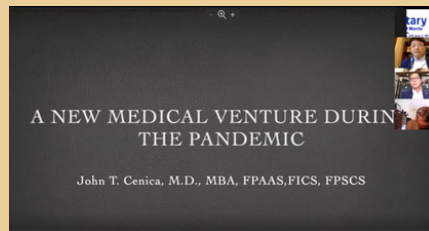

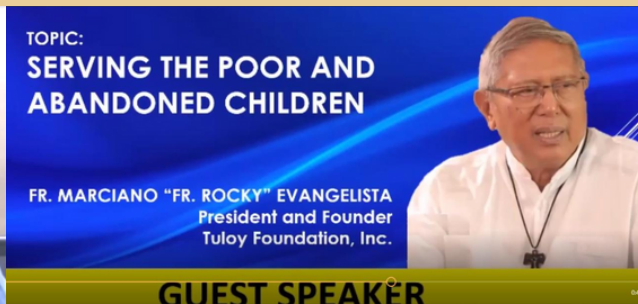

CLUB ADMINISTRATION

KNOW YOUR CLUB CONSTITUTION, BY-LAWS AND POLICIES

Q: What are the duties of the Treasurer under our By-Laws?

A: Our By-Laws under Article III states the following:

"Section 4 – Treasurer

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to have custody of all funds, accounting for same to the club annually and at any other time upon demand by the Board and to perform such other duties as pertain to his office. Upon his retirement from office he shall turn over to his successor or to the President all funds, books of accounts or any other club property in his possession."



Q: What does our Code of Policies state with respect to General Financial Policies?

A: Our Code of Policies as of April 22, 2015, under item 3.1 states as follows:

"3.1 GENERAL FINANCIAL POLICIES

The members of the Board of Directors and officers of The Rotary Club of Manila (RCM), headed by its President and assisted by the Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer(s), by virtue of their position, assume individual and collective fiduciary responsibilities in the management and use of the funds of RCM. They shall be responsible for and, accordingly, make sure that the funds of RCM are safe kept, managed and used in the most prudent manner possible and in accordance with the purposes for which the funds were generated.

RCM funds shall be used exclusively for the furtherance of the objectives, programs and projects of the Rotary Club of Manila and those of Rotary International. No individual or group of RCM members shall be allowed to benefit personally from the use of RCM funds.

The Board of Directors at the beginning of each Rotary year, shall evaluate and approve the annual budget of RCM as submitted by the Treasurer in close consultation and coordination with the President, the Committee Chairmen through their respective Directors-in-Charge, and the other Officers of RCM. The annual budget and the Financial Reports shall be in consonance with the planned activities and projects of RCM, as well as, the ability of RCM to fund such activities and projects. The annual budget shall be classified into two main categories, viz., (a). GENERAL and (b) RESTRICTED. It shall be mandatory on the part of the Treasurer to prepare a General Budget for approval of the President and the RCM Board at the beginning of each Rotary year. However, a budget for Restricted Funds at the beginning of the Rotary year may not be presented as the respective programs/projects for each of the Restricted Funds may not yet be ready at the outset of the Rotary year. The respective committees in charge of the Restricted Funds shall however be required to submit their budgets, prior to the launch of projects they intend to undertake for approval of the President and the RCM Board. Funds under GENERAL shall be used for the general and administrative expenses of the Club. Funds under RESTRICTED shall be used exclusively for the purposes the respective restricted funds were established. Only the RCM Board shall have the authority to approve reallocation of either the General or Restricted Funds.

The Directors and Officers of RCM for a particular year shall ensure that the fiscal implications of their particular year's programs and projects shall be limited to the particular year said Board and Officers are responsible for and shall see to it that the subsequent year's Directors and Officers shall not be burdened by expense overruns or liabilities which they have to assume. To allow for a smooth year to year transition, each incumbent administration shall provide for enough funds to carry the next administration through two to three months of operations while the funding programs of said incoming administration are being worked out."

Witty, intelligent, strong, pragmatic, charming, and a grace under pressure. These are the characteristics of Josiah “Jed” Bartlet, the President of the United States in NBC’s hit television series “The West Wing.” These same qualities best describe Secretary Reggie Yu, President of Times Paint Corporation, a renowned personality in the Junior Chamber International (JCI) world and a sought-after trainer.

The young writer who had penned comic books for his classmates during his childhood days had no idea he would author the world’s first and only coffee table book about a JCI chapter. When he was appointed chairman/author of the book project, he took it as a personal mission to come up with a comprehensive volume of JCI Manila without thinking that it would later become a distinguished book.

Sec. Yu joined Junior Chamber International (JCI) Manila chapter (formerly, Manila Jaycees, the first and premier JCI chapter in Asia) in 1991 and served in various capacities. He was conferred the lifetime membership title of “JCI Senator” in 2000 and served as President of the JCI Senate Manila in 2011–2012, while concurrently serving as National Chairman of “The Outstanding Filipino Awards” (TOFIL) search in collaboration with Insular Life and Assurance Co.

He also served as President of the Anvil Business Club from 2014 to 2015, and President of the Alumni Association of Xavier School in from 2017 to 2019. Apart from this, he is also a member of the Y’s Men Club of Downtown Manila, a sustaining member of the Philippine Institute of Certified Public Accountants and member of the Philippine Association of Management Accountants.

Rhea Vitto Tabora (RVT): As a new Rotarian, how would you describe your experience so far?

Reginald Yu (RY): My moments as a new (Star) Rotarian in the Rotary Club of Manila were both illuminating, yet intimidating. I remember distinctly that, in my first General Membership Meeting, I had a chance to personally sit beside and break bread with a number of esteemed elder Rotarians – such as former Mayor Fred Lim, former SBMA Chair Tong Payumo, former House Speaker Joe de Venecia, former Sec. Jimmy Laya, Archibart Bartolome, et. al. – many of them were illustrious personalities whom I only get to read about in the newspapers or watch on television. To be frank, when I was inducted as a regular member, I was a little unsure of the challenge I had just taken on. I wasn’t even quite sure of what Rotary was, other than just being a volunteer service organization.

After attending Rotary for several weeks, I now know that it is so much more than having “lunch with business people.” My experience as a star Rotarian was nothing short of awesome. I learned a lot from these wise adults, just by listening to their stories or exchanging anecdotes in light banter. I felt extremely welcomed at Rotary by the friendly atmosphere, talkative people, and helpful hosts. I also enjoyed the knowledge and caring that is represented through Rotary. Between the announcements from around the community, invocations, and speakers, I never left Rotary without feeling impacted and learning something new.

RVT: What inspired you to write “Forging Vanguarders”?

RY: I wrote “Forging Vanguarders” in 1998 as a tribute to the men behind the success of the Junior Chamber International (JCI) movement in the Philippines, particularly, with the first and premier JCI chapter established in Asia, the Manila Jaycees (now, JCI Manila). The book was the culmination of my many contributions to the JCI movement as a member. Only later did I realize that it was the first (and only) coffee-table book ever written about a JCI chapter anywhere else in the world. It's still being used as a reference material in JCI.

I have never considered myself a good writer and my experience in authoring books has been scant at best (I don't know if writing comic books for my classmates during my elementary years would be considered a noteworthy experience). But I have always been fascinated by history, especially those clothed with an esteemed past like that of the Jaycees. When JCI Manila was then commemorating its 50th founding year in the Philippines, I wondered aloud how relevant the celebration would become if someone would write a book about its rich history. Apparently, the incoming president at that time, Felix Ang (of CATS Motors) thought that it was a fantastic idea and promptly appointed me chairman/author of the book project. I took it as a personal mission to come up with a comprehensive and definitive volume of JCI Manila.

RVT: If you are to choose a character in a book or movie who is most similar to you, who would you choose and why?

RY: If I were to choose a fictional character, it would have to be Josiah “Jed” Bartlet, the President of the United States in NBC's hit television series, “The West Wing,” an American serial political drama television series created by Aaron Sorkin that was originally broadcast on NBC from September 22, 1999, to May 14, 2006.

The main protagonist is witty, intelligent, and strong. President Bartlet has all of the qualities of a great leader. He's a pragmatic, charming, and tough man who is known for his ability to be graceful under pressure. While he's the "Leader of the Free World," he's still humble. As he once told his staff, "I'm the President of the United States, not the President of the people who agree with me." President Bartlet juggles dozens of important issues in every hour of every day. His job has become his life, but luckily he's got a team of intelligent, dedicated people working around-the-clock to help him run the nation. The President of the United States has the most difficult job in the world. Jed has to juggle a hundred separate things at once, yet he's able to do it all while battling a life-threatening condition, multiple sclerosis.

RVT: What's the last book you read that you couldn't put down?

RY: That would certainly have to be "Team of Rivals," a best-selling 2005 book by Pulitzer Prize-winning American historian Doris Kearns Goodwin. The book is a biographical portrait of U.S. President Abraham Lincoln and some of the men who served with him in his cabinet from 1861 to 1865. It's a story about three of his Cabinet members who had previously run against Lincoln in the 1860 election — Attorney General Edward Bates, Secretary of the Treasury Salmon P. Chase and Secretary of State William H. Seward — all far more experienced, far more educated, far more celebrated leaders than Lincoln. It's also about Lincoln's relationship with his cabinet. Her book showcases Lincoln's remarkable political skills and focuses on the 16th President's mostly successful attempts to reconcile conflicting personalities and political factions on the path to abolition and victory in the American Civil War.

Despite its hefty tome, this immense, finely boned, 944-page masterpiece was far from being a dull administrative or bureaucratic account; rather, it is a story of personalities — a messianic drama, if you will — in which Lincoln's gift for coalition-building has been showcased better than any other writer of the same genre that I have ever come across.

I highly recommend it.

RVT: When and how do you come up with best ideas?

RY: I don't believe that one has to be a deep thinker to come up with the best ideas, but it requires hard work. I believe discipline is key. To get my brain on track to come up with an idea, I often need to surround it with a lot of relevant information. I do a lot of relevant research. I do studies that problematize my existing ideas. I read a lot of other authors who are trying to do similar things. I read books that familiarize myself with the setting of the place I am writing about. I often interact with people outside of my normal social group which will expose me to new ideas and perspectives.

RVT: Name one invention that amazes you until now.

RY: That would have to be the mobile phone. More than just its immeasurable social influence and how it revolutionized society in less than a decade, I'm absolutely fascinated over its science: how voices (and data) are turned into electrical signals; how radio waves travel through the air to a nearby cell tower; how the tower sends voice and data to the person you are calling and the process is reversed so that the person on the other end can hear your voice... all without the need of wires or cables.

It's simply an astounding piece of technology!

RVT: How has the pandemic and lockdown changed your outlook in life?

RY: As I found myself separated from friends and family, fear and anxiety about a disease can be overwhelming and bring about strong emotions. For me, it could sometimes feel that I'm in a state of being trapped in an obsidian pit with no light at the end of the tunnel. But then, sometimes, in the midst of my nadir, I learned to appreciate the little silver linings in life and look at the bright side. For someone who was in a state of perpetual motion, I had to undergo quite an adjustment to appreciate idleness and leisure and rethink my relationship with God, family, loved ones, and friends... in that order. While I may still have access to my mobile phone and social media, but with places of social gathering shut down, the bulk of my day was spent in my home with my family. The slowed pace of life has given me a chance to catch my breath and have the time to pay closer attention to what my kids were saying. And something as simple, and previously unappreciated, as an evening stroll, with or without the family, can now actually be the highlight of my day.

I have taken to catching up long-delayed classics like Jane Austen's "Pride and Prejudice," Franz Kafka's "The Metamorphosis," and Thandie Newton's "Jane Eyre." I also took to enrolling in Harvard University's free on-line classes (HarvardX) on Chinese History and the study of Islam. Looking

beyond the "gloom-and-doom" prognostications that I see in the evening news almost on a daily basis, I have learned to instead focus on expanding what is beautiful about my life and eliminating what no longer serves me. I've learned that, if I just took the time to plan what I want to transpire during this time, what do I want to achieve, and build that into my daily activities, I can make it happen. All told, this time of enforced togetherness has been a time of discoveries - of differences, but also of finding common ground that we might have forgotten about, or never even known before. This disease has shown me how interconnected we all are, in scary ways, but possibly also good ones. I've seen how one place in the world might affect the rest of us.

But on a more personal level, even though I've sometimes felt restless and confined in my own home, this quarantine has given me a precious time with family.

RVT: What event in your life would make a good movie material?

While I've faced a ton of challenges throughout my life, I believe they are nothing compared to the ones encountered by those constantly faced with life's most incredibly formidable adversities, and how they were able to overcome them.

RVT: If you can go out for a road trip with your family right now, where would you go and why?

RY: To be honest, I am never fond of long road trips. It always conjures up images of restless, noisy kids whose "stomachs are always empty and bladders always full." But if I were to choose one destination in the Philippines, it would have to be a ten-hour sojourn north of Metro Manila to the province of Ilocos. The region offers a wide array of attractions to satisfy all types of travelers, from adventure-seekers to sun-worshippers to heritage conservationists to gourmands. The fun thing is that every family member can be any of them in a span of three days.

Vigan is the ideal base for exploring the rest of the region. The city bursts with more activities as the sun sets in. And it offers staying at century-old *bahay-na-bato* converted into guesthouses. For some inexplicable reason, the city of Vigan draws me with its charming architecture, preserved from Spanish colonial times. A walk down cobblestoned Calle Crisologo and a *kalesa* (horse-drawn calash) tour around the city's sights always take me back to the country's idyllic 18th-century, Spanish colonial past.

A ride up to Ilocos Norte can open many beautiful vistas and historical sights, like Paoay Church. For a shot of adrenaline, I could spend a morning at the sand dunes, on sand boards and 4x4s. For something truly spectacular, a horse ride over to the white coastal limestone of the Kapurpurawan Rock Formation can be a real thrill. Finally, another two hours to Pagudpud, the northernmost tip of mainland Luzon, can be a real treat.

RVT: How would you describe your perfect day?

RY: My perfect day would begin by waking up without an alarm, making a delicious breakfast and eating it in my pajamas while I sip on a cup of piping hot chocolate. Then I'd read a good book for a little while on my front porch, followed by a trip to the gym. For lunch I'd love to go out with friends or family somewhere fun and light. In the afternoon, I'd go to a clean bookstore and just browse around, taking in the daylight. At dinnertime, I'd love to spend dinner with good friends or family and end the night with a movie. Overall, a pretty relaxing day, but still full of fun activities.

6 INGREDIENTS FOR MEMBERSHIP GROWTH

Let's admit it: achieving a high growth rate (negative or positive) is easier with a small club. Still, after more than five years of almost continuous decline in membership, my club was excited to report a 60 percent growth in membership from July to October. We had 18 members on 1 July. Now we have 29, with 11 new members inducted in the first trimester of the new Rotary year.

How did we do it? Let me share our recipe:



One public event the club organized included a booth at a neighborhood festival.

1 **Ingredient 1: Less meetings, more service and public events.**

Rotary's Council on Legislation has given a lot of freedom to clubs on how they organize their meetings. So we decided to reduce our regular meetings from four to two per month, which gives us more time for service work and organizing public events.

2 **Ingredient 2: Better service opportunities.**

Many Rotarians are professionals and business leaders, yet most do not use their skills when they volunteer with their club. We changed that in our club by creating teams of Rotarians and non-Rotarians combining their skills to provide free advice to local nonprofits on the strategic issues they face. This is not only more interesting in terms of volunteer work, but it is also more impactful to create positive change in the community.

3 **Ingredient 3: Lower cost.**

By the standards of Washington D.C., our membership dues are not very high, at \$600 per year. But this is too much for many. So we created two new membership types - a membership at half the regular dues for young professionals under 35 years of age, and a spouse/partner membership at one third of the dues.

4 **Ingredient 4: Stronger public image.**

We are organizing better and more regular public events. One of our recent events was a seminar at the World Bank with great speakers on education for peace and social change. That same week we also had a stand at the main festival in our neighborhood. In addition, we have been writing articles for a local blog, the local magazine for our neighborhood in Washington, D.C., and a free newspaper.

5 **Ingredient 5: Strategic planning.**

We now have a strategic plan, our first since the club's creation in 2003. The plan gives us a vision, and clear milestones and targets that we are trying to achieve.

6 **Ingredient 6: Luck.**

Part of our gain in membership was just luck, as two new members transferred from other clubs due to changes in jobs and the location of their workplace. What's great is that they bring with them a lot of experience in Rotary.

It remains to be seen whether we will continue on the path of membership growth for the rest of the year. We expect some members to relocate, so we will need to recruit more members to compensate. But we are making progress, and we have exciting initiatives coming up that should help us become better known in the community, make a larger difference for the less fortunate, and hopefully continue to grow.
