PRESIDENT'S CORNER



Happy Easter, Fellow Rotarians!

We thank the Lord for keeping us safe during this pandemic. The strain is very contagious, but the sting may not be as deadly. The anticipated surge we are experiencing in the NCR has brought much pressure due to lack of quarantine facilities and overworked frontliners. Many hospitals are turning down patients because of the surge in demand.

Most of us, Rotarians, have suffered business setbacks, deaths and further losses in our companies' coffers. We pray for God's intervention to heal those affected with CoVid-19 and comfort their families. We also pray for a dramatic decline in the number of CoVid cases in our country and across the globe.

The economy should open, and the campaign for proper physical distancing and use of face mask as well as face shield should be strictly encouraged. We need exact data on CoVid cases, heart attacks, cancer, diabetes and influenza.

On the one hand, many businesses thrive via online marketing. Some logistics companies, pandemic accessories, testing kits, health products, as well as small farms around the NCR are successfully navigating the CoVid-19 pandemic.

On the other hand, many companies are hurting. Businesses in the transportation and tourism industries, condominium developments, restaurants, bars, hotel and resorts, airlines, shipping, malls, convention centers, and other travel and tourism-related sectors are experiencing huge losses.

"Donations, both cash and in kind, have dwindled because of the continuous lockdown. Hospicio de San Jose is in bad shape," as reported by Sister Corrie.

We have been helping Hospicio de San Jose for years, and we have to continue supporting them. Chairman Ray Davis, who has taken over, is seeking support from RCM to consider raising some funds regularly. This year alone, I donated Php 200,000 from my company. I am willing to donate another Php 50,000 just to start the fund raising. Chairman Ray Davis has pledged Php 20,000. I also sent a message to DG Odie Tarriela if we can help Hospicio de San Jose on the district level, as no other organization can support it.

May I suggest our members to get support from their friends and other institutions whom they can influence, to help unburden our members. We will campaign to ask our Star Rotarians for some contributions. Many are in dire need. We have to go out of our way to help and serve. That is what Rotary is all about, Service Above Self for God's glory.

Your Board has been active through Zoom during this lockdown. We are raising funds, looking for new projects, and inviting more leaders in various industries to join us. Our total members have reached 226 Rotarians, as of today. We have pledges of over 12 more members for recruitment. We will continue to increase our members until June.

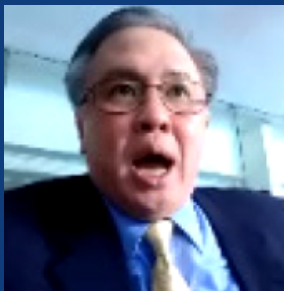

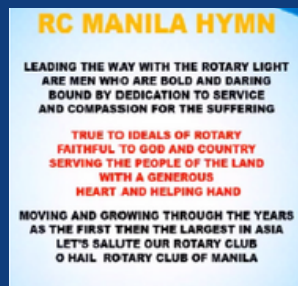

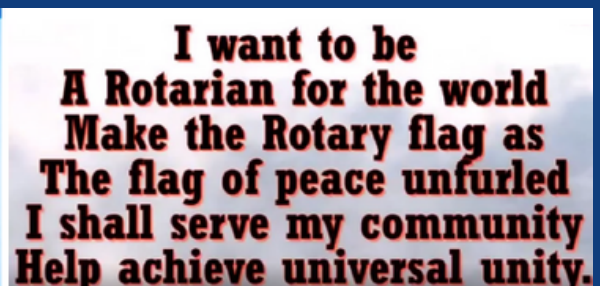

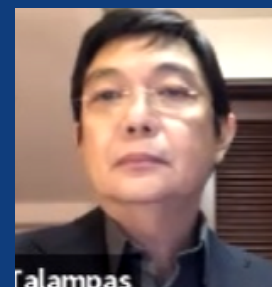

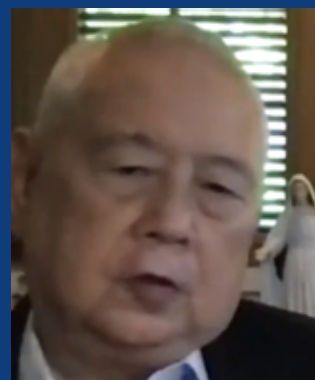

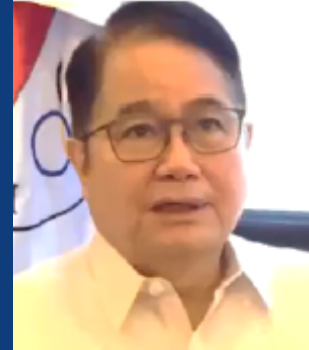

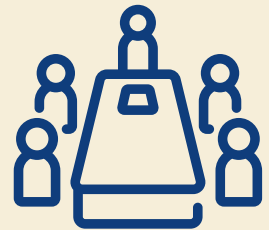
Q: Are all Board Members required to attend Board Meetings?

Ex-officio officers in deputy capacity may be invited / required to attend board meetings or in the anticipated absence of the main ex-officio officer. RCM members who are not currently serving officers may only attend upon explicit invitation from the Board."

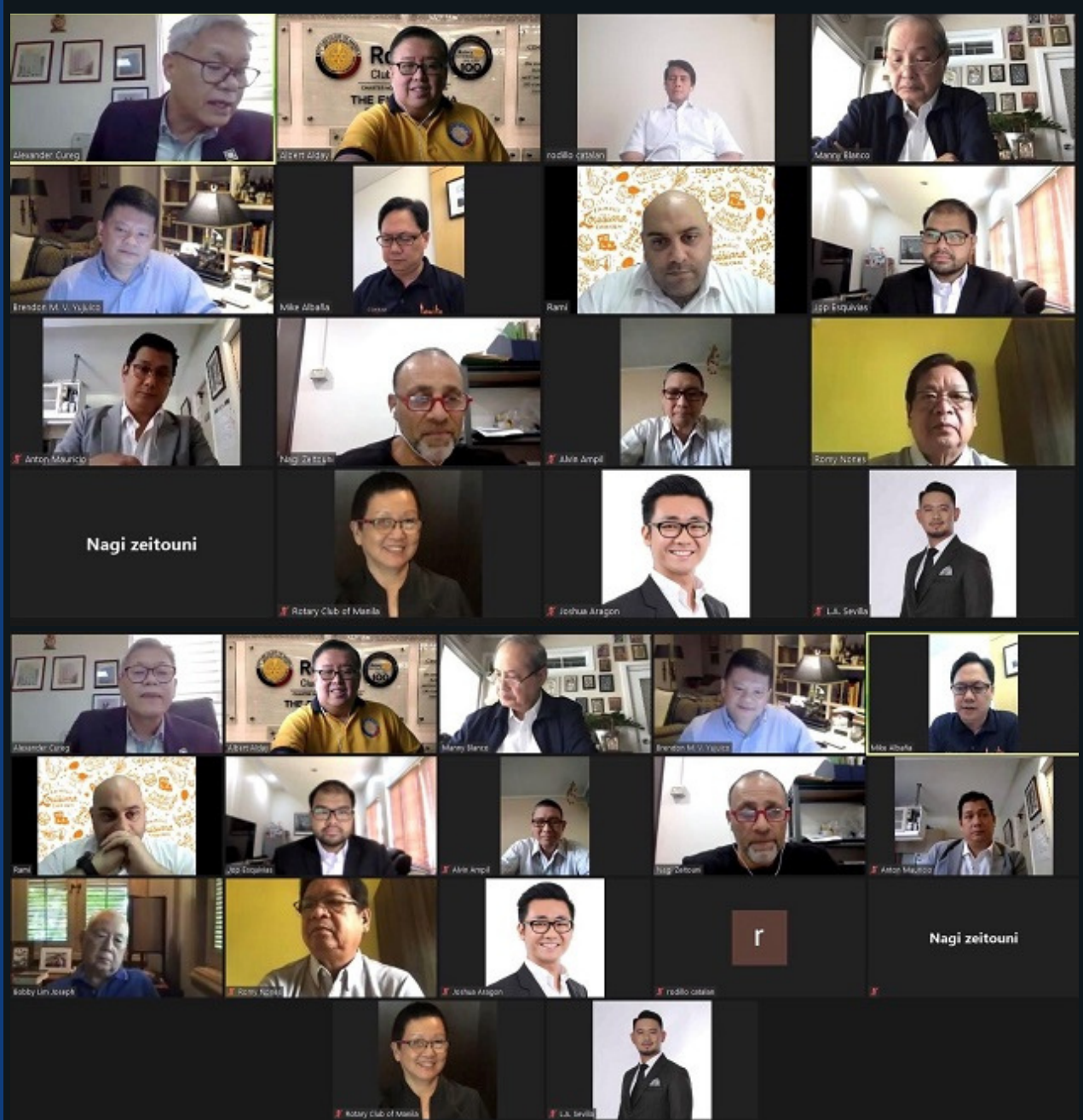

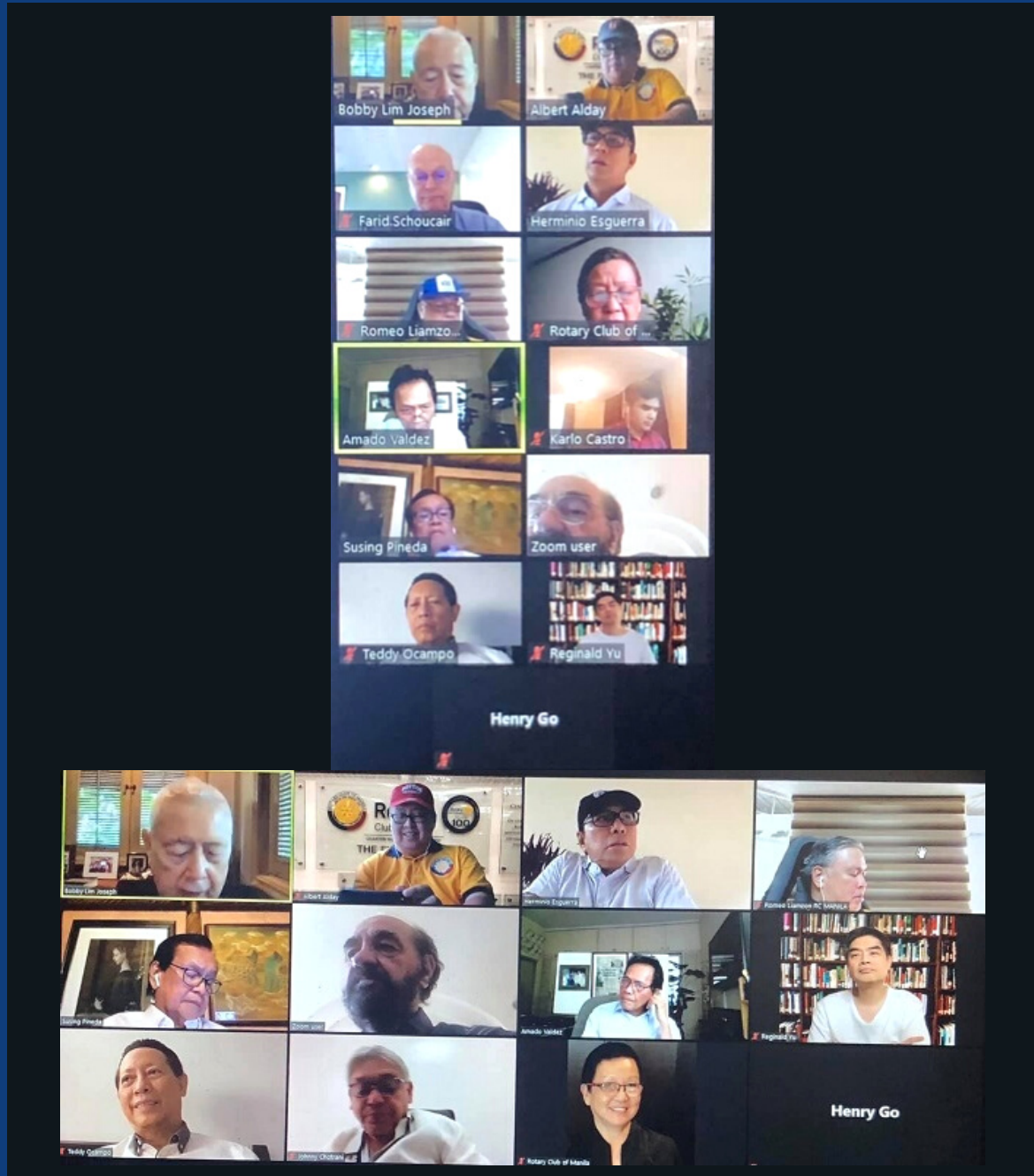

The legacy

The Rotary Club of Seattle, 100 years old on June 15, 2009,
is a remarkable organization.
Contemplate what has transpired since nine young men first
met at the Olympia Club in Seattle. The club has...

- ...become the fourth oldest of more than 52,000 Rotary clubs,
which have 1.2 million members in nearly 200 countries and
geographical regions around the globe.
- ...grown to become the largest of all Rotary clubs, now with
nearly 700 members.
- ...pioneered the ideal of service as the core value of Rotary.
- ...led the way in sharing Rotary locally, regionally and across
the Pacific.
- ...contributed consistently - and sometimes even monumentally -
to the well-being of the Greater Seattle community.
- ...excelled as an innovative leader and active participant in
Rotary's World Community Service.
- ...gained a reputation as the premiere speakers' forum in
the Northwest.
- ...developed a unique bond of fellowship among business,
professional and community leaders who share a commitment
to service.

So, as Number Four turns 100, this is a story of a rich history,
legacy and an exciting vision for the future.

How it all started

In 1908 a young lawyer named Paul Harris, who was a
newcomer to Chicago, thought, "Why not - even in big, bustling
Chicago - have a fellowship composed of one person from each
of many occupations, without restrictions as to their politics or
religion and with broad latitude of each other's opinion?"

The February, Harris met with a coal dealer, a mining engineer,
a merchant tailor, a printer, a real-estate agent and a piano
manufacturer. He outlined his plan for mutual cooperation and
informal fellowship. They soon started "rotating" meetings from
one member's place of business to another. Thus, Rotary
was born.

They used first names. They emphasized attendance, fellowship
and cooperation. They soon grew into a diverse membership.
The original concept focused on "reciprocity" meaning helping
each other in their businesses.

Go west, young club

Paul Harris started corresponding with Homer Wood, a lawyer
in San Francisco who organized club #2 in November 1908,
and with Arthur Holman, club #3 in Oakland.

Holman was the San Francisco manager
for Travelers Insurance and, in 1909, talked
about Rotary in his Seattle counterpart,
Roy Denny. The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific
Exposition was getting under way. Times
were good. Seattle was booming. Denny
and others welcomed the Rotary idea.

The founding members met every
day for three weeks in May 1909,
agreeing on what Rotary should mean
and what it should do. Then, on
June 15, 1909, nine men met at the
Olympus Club and Rotary in the
Pacific Northwest was off and running.
Within a year there were 85 members.

Planting "the seed of service"

Three men emerged as leaders of the new
Seattle club - and ultimately of the Rotary
movement. They were Roy Denny, the
insurance man who at 31 became the first
president, Jim Prinkham, 27, a lumber
wholesaler, and Ernest "Ernie" Skel, a
28-year-old lawyer.

At the initial national meeting in Chicago
in 1910, Skel helped draft Rotary's first
constitution. He said, "Reciprocity, in the largest
sense, means not just getting but also giving.
We should be willing to give our time and
money to ideas which uplift our people".
Thus, the seed of service - a seed that has
grown and flourished over the past century,
was planted in Rotary.

He profits most who serves best

Prinkham, Skel and Denny all went to the
second national convention in Portland in
1911. Denny was national vice president.

Prinkham, as chair of the Resolution
Committee, said, "Rotary membership is
both a responsibility and a privilege. If one
is not met and the other used, the result will
be progressive efforts for good. He profits
most who serves best."

Three let six words, "he profits most who
serves best," had been in a report sent in from
the Committee on Business Methods. When that
report was read, Prinkham jumped to his feet
and said, "Here is a positive affirmation
packaged in six words. It should be put into
Rotary's platform." The conventioners agreed
with a "bona-fide applause." By many,
that is seen as a defining moment in the
development of Rotary. "The profits most who
serves best" entered Rotary for over half a century
and evolved into today's "Service Above Self."

How Rotary became the first "Service Club"

Ernie Skel wrote the original Five Objectives
of Rotary, most of which remain today in
Rotary's Object of Rotary, with its four
pillars of service.

Skel's fifth object read: "To
quicken the interest of each
member in the public welfare
and to cooperate with others in
civic development." When that
idea was adopted at the 1911
convention, Rotary became the
world's first service club.

In a 1941 letter, Paul Harris said, "I can't tell you
how large Prinkham, Skel and Denny loomed
up in those formative days, as authors of the
"Seattle Platform" taken over by International."

Rotary serves in World War I

During World War I, Seattle Rotary had more
than 300 members - and faced its first test as a
real service club. The club sold Liberty Bonds,
entertained servicemen, and sent money for
children in war-torn Europe. In 1919, they
helped veterans in job-training classes.

Roaring into high gear in the Twenties

During the 1920s, Seattle Rotarians raised \$50,000 to help Children's Orthopedic Hospital - contributions worth over \$1 million in today's dollars.

They also bought a site for a Boy Scout camp on Mowat Island, named it Camp Rotary, and financed the camp supervisor and two scout masters. Imagine what that property would be worth today!

Holding it together during the depression

When the Great Depression struck, donations were hard to come by. The Club transferred Camp Rotary to the Scouts, who kept it for 20 years and sold it for enough to build a large camp in Steadman Canyon.

The Seattle club hosted an extremely successful international convention in 1932 at the "spacious and comfortable Civic Auditorium." Considering the economy, the attendance of 5,139 from 53 countries was truly remarkable.

In the mid-Thirties, membership declined as many could not pay their dues. Yet, somewhere the Seattle club raised \$800 for improvements for Boy Scout Camp Parnon.

When the Olympic Hotel announced that the price of lunch was going up to a dollar, Seattle Rotary said 95 cents was all they would pay. The hotel obliged.

On the international front, Hitler outlawed Rotary in the Third Reich.

Serving on the home front during WWII

During the four years of World War II, Seattle Rotarians diligently got behind the war effort, both as individuals and as a club. Twenty-two members enlisted in the armed services, as did 286 of their sons and daughters. Nine did not return.

Rotarians helped start the Seattle Blood Bank, entertained service personnel, helped at the USO, assisted with recruiting for the armed forces and Boeing, and helped find housing for war workers.

In 1942, club members provided materials for construction of a 45-room guesthouse for wives and mothers of service personnel.

Rotarians took over Victory Square on University Street for war bond sales. One year, they broke all records by topping \$7 million in sales, \$1 million of it in one day. They also led a drive to collect aluminum pots and pans in the Square, handing signs that read "America is worth defending" and "Turn aluminum into airplanes."

Laying the foundation for great things to come

By 1940, the club was being deluged with so many appeals from worthy causes that it formed the Rotary Youth Foundation to give more focus and impact to future service projects. Known as the Seattle Rotary Service Foundation since 1968, the Foundation has enabled the club to make major contributions to the community over the past 60 years.

Hosting a second R.I. convention

When Seattle played host to Rotarians of the world in 1954, there were three memorable highlights: 3,000 guests being hosted in 254 Seattle-area homes (a first); a keynote address by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles; and the magnificence of Puget Sound scenery. The Convention went into the record books as a resounding success.



- To promote acquaintance in 1912, Ernie Skel and E. G. Shorrock devised various contests to see who could go around the room and identify the name and business of the most members.
- April 30, 1915 was booster day for the Golden Potlatch, Seattle's new summer festival. The president of Potlatch was a Rotary member.
- Several 1915 meetings were devoted to understanding the Port Commission's proposed development for Harbor Island.
- In 1914, half the members were given a number and half a letter. If "S" didn't know "T", he bought the cigars and they proceeded to get chummy.
- Debates were held in 1914 on such current issues as Panama Canal tolls, construction of an Alaskan railroad and the "Mexican situation."
- Tacoma Rotary sent a delegation to Seattle in 1916, using help in changing the name of Mount Rainier to Mount Tacoma.
- By 1917, heavy emphasis on reciprocity vanished. It became understood that any business between members was based on "personality, reputation and ability" rather than upon a sense of obligation.

Service has been multiplied by sharing Rotary

In the past century, Rotary in the Greater Pacific Northwest has grown from nine members to an army of 51,000 in nearly 600 clubs - all dedicated to the goal of "Service Above Self."

Seattle has led the way in sharing Rotary perhaps as much as any club in the world. Between 1910 and 1920, Seattle #4 established Tacoma #8, Portland #15, Spokane #21, Vancouver #61, Victoria #90 (the first two in Western Canada), as well as Everett, Bellingham, Yakima, Aberdeen and Centralia.

In 1919, Roger Peters, a steamship executive and Seattle past president, founded the first clubs in Asia - Manila and Shanghai. In 1920, Seattle organized Ketchikan #2000, the first club in Alaska.

In 1937, Kirkland became the second club in King County. Seattle led the way again in 1939 when it organized the University District club. This was the first time any club had ever relinquished territory within its own city.

Seattle Rotary values its "offspring" and is the first to recognize that sheer size is no measure of true Rotary service. One dedicated true Rotarian can often be the equal of one hundred spectators.

- Seattle sponsored Tacoma, Portland and Spokane, which became clubs #8, 15 and 21. All have contributed mightily to sharing Rotary in the Northwest.
- In 1919, Seattle established clubs in Manila and Shanghai, the first Rotary Clubs in Asia.
- Vancouver and Victoria were the first clubs in Western Canada - both chartered by Seattle.
- Seattle's sponsorship of Ketchikan in 1920 led to Rotary throughout Alaska. (Now with 57 clubs and 1000 members.)
- Everett, Bellingham, Yakima, Aberdeen and Centralia were sponsored between 1916 and 1920.

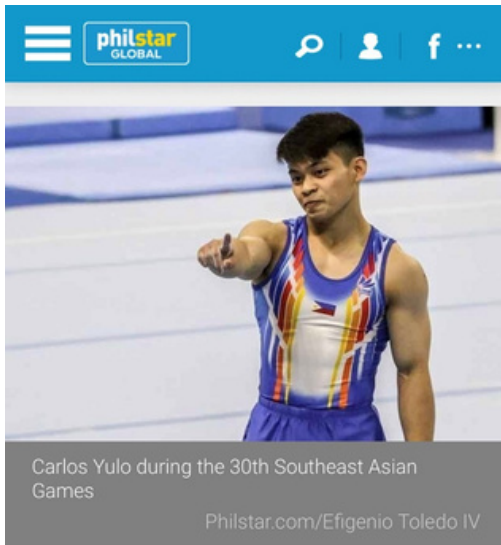
In history, there is one man who paved the way for the Philippines to be recognized by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) as a country of consequence in the world of sports. He was Jorge B. Vargas who became the first Filipino member of the IOC in 1936. Frank Elizalde and Mikee Cojuangco-Jaworski later followed in his footsteps to represent the Philippines in the IOC.

Vargas was a founding member of the Philippine Amateur Athletic Federation (PAAF), precursor of the Philippine Olympic Committee (POC), in 1911, joined the PAAF Executive Committee in 1918 and served as PAAF vice president from 1925 to 1935 and president from 1936 to 1955. He was head of the Philippine delegation at the 1948 and 1952 Olympics and Asian Games Federation president from 1950 to 1954.

Vargas played an instrumental role in bringing the Asian Games to Manila in 1954. Deeply ingrained in his nationalist vision, he saw in the goal of sports development a vehicle to improve the Filipino's well-being and in the spirit of competition a source of Filipino pride.

Beyond sports, Vargas made an impact in government service as the country's first Executive Secretary from 1936 to 1941, vice mayor of Manila from 1931 to 1940, mayor of Manila from 1941 to 1942, secretary of National Defense in 1941 and chairman of the National Planning Commission from 1946 to 1954. In 1960, he was conferred the Philippine Legion of Honor with the rank of Commander and in 1967, presented the Presidential Award for Meritorious Service. Vargas died in 1980 at the age of 89.

After Tokyo, Yulo Eyes Paris

MANILA, Philippines — No matter what happens in the coming Tokyo Olympics, world champion gymnast Carlos Yulo is set on competing in the 33rd Summer Games in Paris in 2024. By then, he'll be 24 and still in his prime. Three-event world titlist Nikita Nagornyy of Russia looms as Yulo's main competitor in Tokyo and he's now 24. Yulo and Nagornyy performed at the World Championships in Stuttgart, Germany, in October 2019 with the Filipino claiming the gold medal in the floor exercise despite being the youngest competitor at 19 years, seven months, 26 days.

Gymnastics Association of the Philippines president Cynthia Carrion said the other day Yulo is determined to do the triple backflip for the first time in Tokyo. It's a high-risk, high-reward gamble but he's got his eyes on the prize. "Caloy's doing fine, working hard but of course, he needs refining in sticking to the floor, no skipping," said Carrion. "If he does the triple backflip well, it's a sure gold. We'll know by June if

he'll do it or not. Nikita faltered (in Stuttgart) and that opened the door for Caloy to win the gold.

Yulo was geared to participate in three world-class competitions this year but because of the pandemic, the events were cancelled. "Not enough preparation through competitions but his training in Japan is doing well," noted Carrion. "He's dedicating Tokyo to our country. After Tokyo, Caloy will go back home and train with his colleagues for the SEA Games in Vietnam."

Japanese coach Munehiro Kugimiya said Yulo's on track to earn an associate degree in literature at Teikyo University in September. Yulo has the option of continuing to study at Teikyo where he could graduate with a bachelor's degree in two more years. Kugimiya said if Manila isn't able to put up a world-standard gymnastics facility, Yulo is better off staying in Tokyo where he has trained the last four years.

Yulo was recently given the Jorge B. Vargas Most Outstanding Athlete Award by the Rotary Club of Manila, the biggest and first Rotary Club in Asia with 223 members. He garnered 41 votes to win the award over five other outstanding athletes. Weightlifter Hidilyn Diaz took second place and golfer Yuka Saso, third. The annual award is a project initiated by Rotary Club of Manila immediate past president Jackie Rodriguez, formerly Toyota team manager in the PBA. There are 1,016 Rotary Clubs in the country with 25,000 members in 10 districts. The Rotary Club of Manila is one of 117 clubs in District 3810 where Liza Elorde is the immediate past governor. Sportsman Hermie Esguerra is the Rotary Club of Manila programs committee chairman and immediate past vice president.

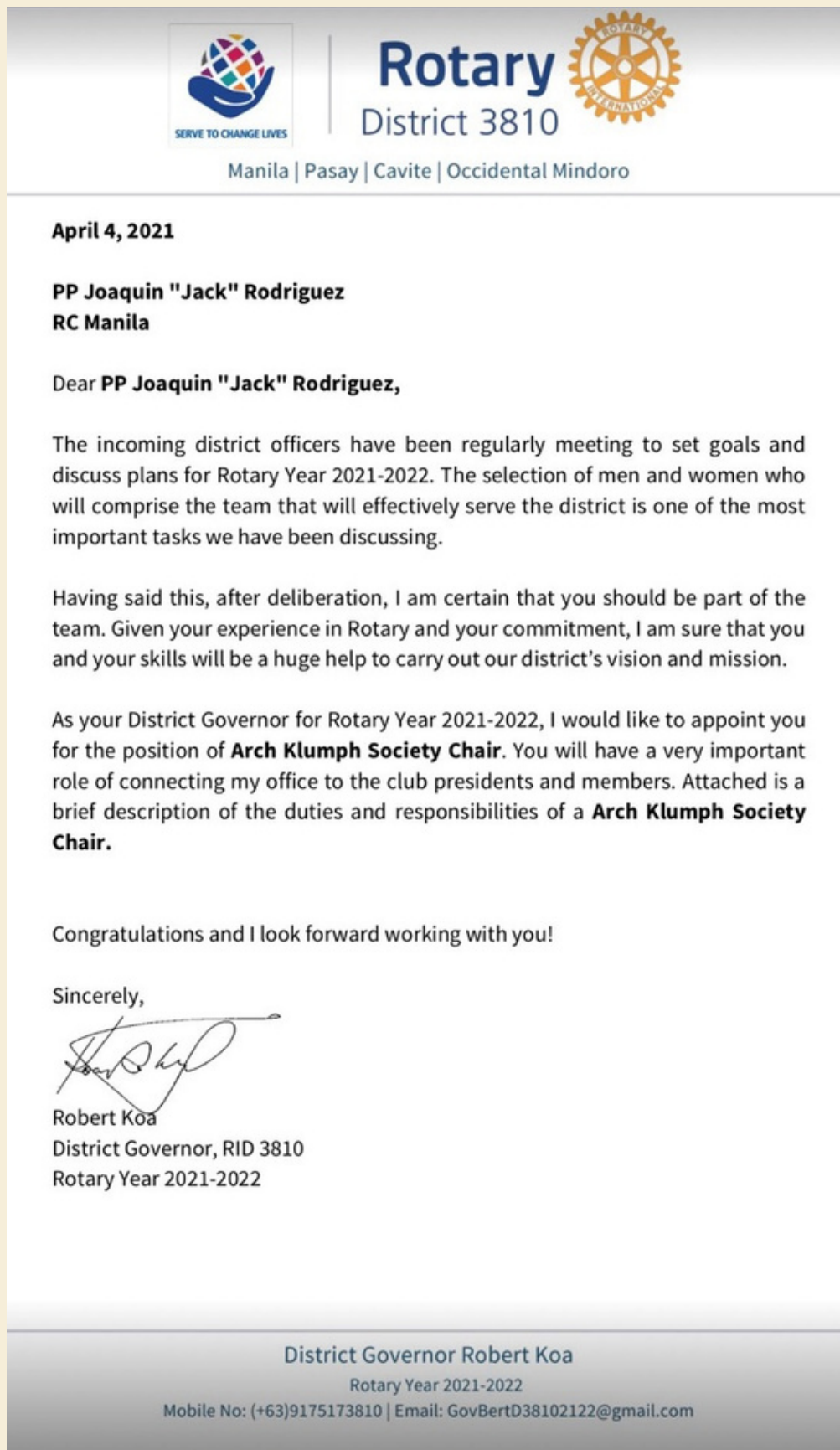

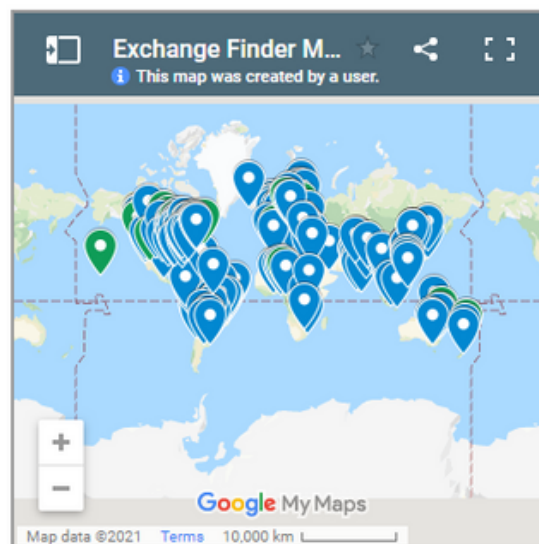
