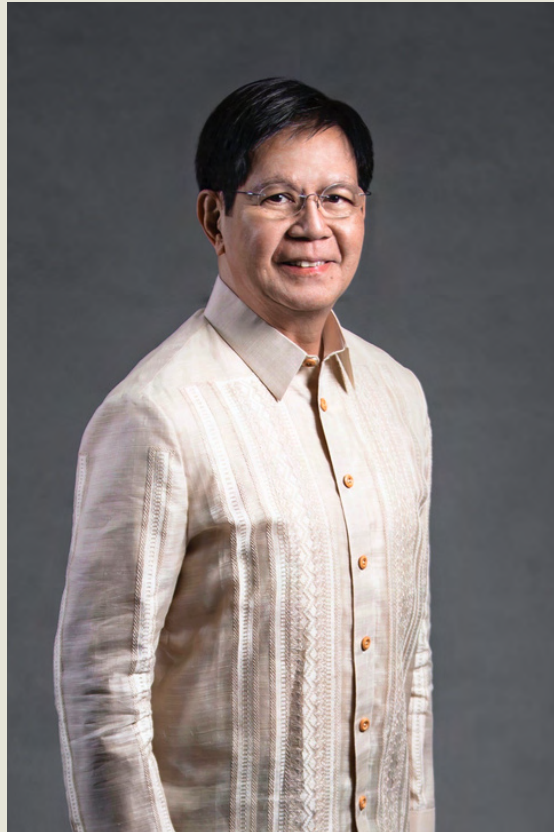

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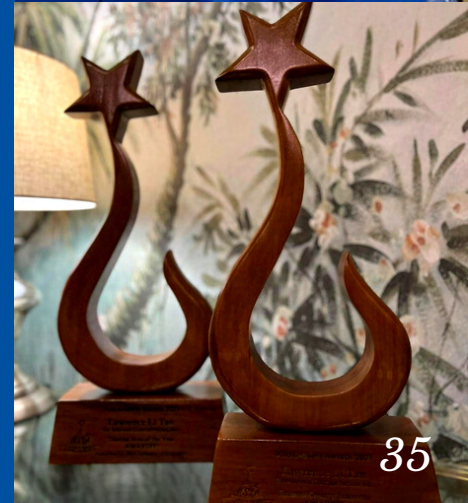

PROFILE OF GUEST OF HONOR AND SPEAKER

HON. PANFILO "PING" M. LACSON

Introduction Piece

Our Guest of Honor and Speaker, a member of the Matatag Class of 1971 of the Philippine Military Academy, is a distinguished servant leader in our country. He is best known for his distinctive motto: ***What is right must be kept right; what is wrong must be set right*** – a personal credo he has faithfully observed in his more than 40 years of public service.

His rise to national consciousness started when he solved high-profile crimes, including kidnap-for-ransom cases, in the 1980s and 1990s. In 1999, he was tasked to head the Philippine National Police, which under his watch enjoyed a revival of its glory days – along with the highest public approval ratings in its history.

In 2001, he earned a Senate seat where he continued to show his no-nonsense brand of leadership. He exhibited his consistent and unflinching resolve, particularly in his call to scrap the pork barrel fund, then known as the Priority Development Assistance Fund (PDAF), as early as 2003 – a full 10 years before the pork barrel scam involving Janet Lim-Napoles exploded in the Filipino people's collective faces. He also made sure his P200-million-a-year PDAF entitlement was returned to the national treasury.

While in the Senate, he also led a sturdy crusade against graft and corruption, as evidenced by the bills he filed and the exposes he made of anomalous transactions that marred our public institutions.

During the 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th Congresses from 2001 to 2013, he authored or co-authored landmark legislations, including the Anti-Money Laundering Law and amendments thereto; Anti-Human Trafficking Act of 2001; Anti-Red Tape Act of 2007; Revised AFP Modernization Program; Responsible Parenthood and Reproductive Health; and, Sin Tax or the Excise Tax on Alcohol and Tobacco.

In the aftermath of Super Typhoon Yolanda (international codename: Haiyan) that caused widespread destruction, damage and death in Central Philippines, he was appointed Presidential Assistant for Rehabilitation and Recovery, with the unenviable mandate of unifying the rehabilitation and recovery efforts of government and the private sector. Despite limited authority and government resources, his office crafted an eight-volume, 8,000-page Comprehensive Rehabilitation and Recovery Plan with a P167-billion proposed funding in a record six months.

His efforts in the Yolanda rehabilitation led to the institutionalization of essential mechanisms that assisted calamity-affected communities in building back better, faster and safer.

In the 2016 elections, the Filipino people again entrusted him with a Senate seat. As a member of the 17th Congress, he continues to safeguard public interest and fight corruption, particularly by shielding the national budget from pork and other machinations, so it can truly spur inclusive growth for Filipinos. He continues to advance his legislative agenda to initiate programs on budget reform and village empowerment, transparency and public accountability, antigraft and corruption, and public order and security.

Among the laws he authored and/or sponsored in the 17th Congress are the Act Establishing the Philippine Identification (National ID) System (Republic Act 11055), which provides for easier transactions with the government and private entities and which helps deter criminality; the Free Irrigation Law (RA 10969); the Anti-Hazing Law of 2018 (RA 11053); the law restoring the subpoena powers of the Philippine National Police-Criminal Investigation and Detection Group (RA 10973); and the act providing for the rank classification in the Philippine National Police (RA 11200).

He also had a key role in crafting the law amending the Anti-Money Laundering Act to include casinos as "covered persons" (RA 10927); and Joint Resolution No. 01, that authorized the increase in the base pay of military and uniformed personnel in the government.

In the 18th Congress, the laws he authored and/or sponsored include the Anti-Terrorism Act of 2020 (RA 11479), the Bayanihan to Heal As One Act (RA 11469); and the Good Manners and Right Conduct (GMRC) and Values Education Act (RA 11476).

To this day, he remains an untiring, tenacious watchdog of the national budget, making sure dubious congressional insertions and useless appropriations – a.k.a. 'pork' – are checked and deleted during plenary debates.

Because of his continued crusade against wrongdoing, particularly against the pork barrel system in all its iterations, the Pamantasan ng Lungsod ng Maynila, where he earned his Master's Degree in Government Management, conferred on him last March 27 the degree of Doctor of Laws, Honoris Causa - a distinction that inspires him to remain committed to excellence in public service.

Ladies and Gentlemen, let us all give a warm welcome to Honorable Senator Panfilo M. Lacson!

ADVOCACIES

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COVID-19 RESPONSE

SPECIAL RISK ALLOWANCE FOR HEALTH WORKERS:

Introduced the Special Risk Allowance for front liners on top of their regular hazard pay (Bayanihan I Law)

FINANCIAL AID AND MEDICAL ASSISTANCE FOR HEALTH WORKERS:

Provided P1 million financial assistance in case of death and P100,000 and medical assistance to infected health workers (Bayanihan I Law)

P1-BILLION ADDITIONAL BUDGET:

Increased the DOH budget allotted for urban and rural areas by P1 billion in 2020.

P8.6-BILLION BUDGETARY ADJUSTMENT:

Proposed the increase of DOH programmed appropriations for the Health Facilities and Enhancement Program from P5.9 billion to P14.6 billion.

EDUCATION SECTOR

P3.6-BILLION MORE FOR FLEXIBLE LEARNING OPTIONS.

Increased by P3.6 billion the funding for self-learning modules of learners without access to internet and gadgets

P910-MILLION FOR MEDICAL EXAM OF TEACHERS.

P910 million for the medical examination of public school teachers

P8.3-BILLION FOR FREE HIGHER EDUCATION:

Realigned illegal congressional insertions to fund for the first time free tuition for all students of state colleges and universities throughout the country. This was before the passage of the Free Tuition Act.

P770-MILLION CASH ALLOWANCE FOR TEACHERS.

Increased the budget of the DepEd for the Cash Allowance of Teachers to P770,656,000 in 2017.

P1.05-BILLION CHALK ALLOWANCE TO TEACHERS.

Provided a total of P1,050,000,000 for chalk allowance for teachers in 2018.

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EDUCATION SECTOR

P700-MILLION CLOTHING & UNIFORM ALLOWANCE FOR TEACHERS.

Provided P700 million to increase the allowances for the clothing and uniform expenses of teachers.

ANTI-CORRUPTION

P300-BILLION PLUS SAVINGS:

Saved public monies from wastage and corruption through his consistent budget scrutiny

CUSTOMS TARA SYSTEM.

Exposed the systemic corrupt practices of employees of the Bureau of Customs during the Senate investigation on the P6.05 billion shabu importation.

PHILHEALTH CORRUPTION.

Exposed the flaws and loopholes in the current case rate system, millions worth of fraudulent claims, and the PhilHealth mafia.

P6-BILLION "TONGPATS" SCHEME IN THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.

Revealed the P6 billion pork importation racket within the Department of Agriculture.

RECYCLING OF APPOINTEES.

Vocal on his stand against the administration's habit of "recycling" into various agencies appointees involved in corruption issues.

OVERPRICED VACCINES.

Called out the DOH's non-transparent procurement of Sinovac vaccines.

PUBLIC ORDER AND ILLEGAL DRUGS

NO TO DOUBLE STANDARDS.

Since 2016, called out the Duterte administration's "double standard" in its war against illegal drugs - particularly why those killed are from poor families and not the masterminds

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PUBLIC ORDER AND ILLEGAL DRUGS

TOUGHER LAWS VS. TERRORISM AND TERRORIST FINANCING.

Strengthened existing laws to address terrorist groups, including extremists that formed alliances with groups like ISIS - while putting in place safeguards against possible abuses by those tasked to implement the law.

PNP INVOLVEMENT IN KILLINGS.

Presided over investigations that shed light on the involvement of several PNP officers in killings and abductions, including the cases of Korean citizen Jee Ick Joo, Albura Mayor Rolando Espinosa and teenager Kian delos Santos.

INCREASED THE CHR BUDGET.

Sponsored and increased the budget of the Commission on Human Rights to P863 Million after being given only a budget of P1.00 by the House of Representatives.

POSITION ON KEY ISSUES

VOTED AGAINST TRAIN LAW:.

Opposed the imposition of additional taxes and moved for the reduction of the VAT rate to 10% after reducing the 143 types of exemptions down to the basic necessities and imposing mechanisms to avoid leakages in collection.

ASSERTING PHILIPPINE SOVEREIGNTY IN THE WEST PHILIPPINE SEA.

Firm in invoking the Philippines' win in its claim over the West Philippine Sea against China.

FREE IRRIGATION.

Authored the law waiving irrigation fees for farmers owning 8 hectares of land or less.

NO TO OVERREGULATION OF BUSINESS.

Supports all forms of businesses with a vision of avoiding over regulation in order to thrive while at the same time encouraging further investments that will create jobs.

ABS-CBN FRANCHISE.

Supports the renewal of the franchise of ABS-CBN.

ANTI-RED TAPE.

Sponsored the Anti-Red Tape Act of 2007, which brings down the number of steps and days involved in a government transaction, and in turn paves the way for efficient and expeditious public service.

CORRUPTION EXPOSES

"HELLO GARCI" 2004 ELECTION FRAUD.

Investigated vote-rigging and election fraud involving high-ranking officials

P105-MILLION CHOPPER SCAM:

Exposed the involvement of then First Gentleman Mike Arroyo in the P105-million sale of Arroyo's two used civilian helicopters as brand new to the PNP.

P12-BILLION ANOMALOUS STIMULUS PACKAGE:

Initiated the investigation of the plan to channel P12.5 billion in Social Security System (SSS) funds into the administration coffers during the Arroyo administration.

P5-BILLION QUEDANCOR SCAM:

Revealed the multibillion-peso swine scam on the irregularities of the Quedan and Rural Credit Guarantee Corp. (Quedancor) to fund Arroyo's 2004 bid for re-election.

P728-MILLION FERTILIZER SCAM:

Exposed the release, through then DA Sec. Jocjoc Bolante, of P728 million fertilizer funds to local officials for vote buying in favor of Arroyo's re-election bid for President.

\$329-MILLION NBN-ZTE DEAL:

Sought the investigation of the \$329-million National Broadband Network deal with China's ZTE Corp that was overpriced by \$130 million to cover kickbacks during the Arroyo administration.

\$470-MILLION IMPSA DEAL.

Pushed for the investigation of the \$14 million bribe of gov't officials by Argentine firm Industrias Metallurgicas Perscamona, SA (IMPSA) in the \$470 million contract to repair and operate the Caliraya-Botocan-Kalayaan hydroelectric plant in Laguna during the Arroyo administration.

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CORRUPTION EXPOSES

P500–MILLION OVERPRICED LAMP POSTS.

Exposed the overpriced decorative lamp posts in the construction of the Cebu International Convention Center in preparation for the 12th ASEAN Summit during the Arroyo administration.

DISTINCTIONS

HIGHEST– EVER RECORDED APPROVAL RATINGS FOR PNP:

Under Lacson's watch as its Chief, the PNP earned a whopping 64% approval rating in July and October 2000, the highest ever recorded from the Filipino people. Lacson himself got an approval rating of 73% as Chief PNP in July 2000, thus regaining the PNP's glory years by restoring public trust in the police force. The figures were based on surveys by Pulse Asia in 2000]

NO TO KOTONG POLICY.

Rid the streets of of the "kotong cops" extorting hard-earned money of public utility drivers, vegetable and rice dealers, and street vendors

RESCUED VICTIMS OF KIDNAP–FOR–RANSOM SYNDICATES.

Led operations resulting in the rescue of kidnap victims and refused to receive money from relatives to thank him for his service.

CRACKDOWN ON JUETENG OPERATIONS.

Launched a campaign against jueteng and other forms of illegal gambling, no matter who gets hit.

34–INCH WAISTLINE.

Gave pot-bellied police officers a deadline to bring down their waistlines

RETURN OF CARNAPPED VEHICLES.

His first directive as the Chief PNP was to have police personnel immediately return the recovered carnapped vehicles in their possession – whether personally or incognito. In less than two weeks, Camp Crame and the nearby flyover became a virtual parking lot for 600 of such vehicles, which were returned to their rightful owners.

IMPROVED CAPACITY OF LOCAL POLICE.

He downloaded 85% of the PNP's budget to the operating units to improve the overall management, and removed the excess privileges of top police officials.

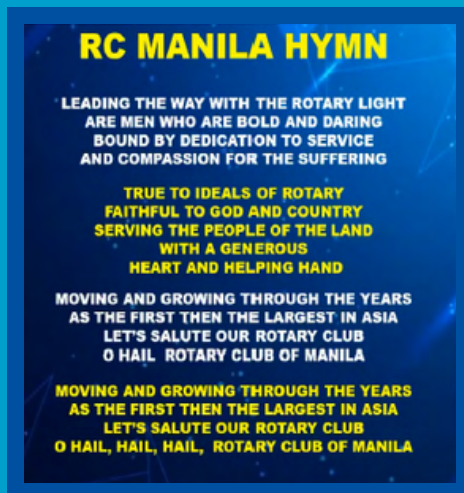

Global Partnership for Education Teams Up with Rotary to Advocate for Education

Rotary's relationship with the Global Partnership for Education is already having an impact, as incoming district governors learned at the International Assembly in January. "Together we are changing the lives of girls and other vulnerable children in the poorest corners of the world," said Alice P. Albright, the organization's chief executive officer, in her remarks about the relationship, formed in April 2020. "Rotary has a unique voice and standing on the global stage and in virtually every country. You can use that voice to advocate for more resources and then work with government leaders to ensure that they are distributed equitably."

GPE is a multi-stakeholder partnership and global fund that facilitates improved outcomes and gender equity in education and supports large-scale changes to education systems around the world. In Rwanda, for example, GPE helped increase access to early childhood education by funding training for more than 5,500 teachers, developing teaching kits and play-based instructional materials, and building 400 schools. In Kenya, the organization helped implement a plan that included making primary education free, which increased enrollment from 72 percent in 2003 to 88 percent in 2012 and closed the gender gap, achieving nearly equal numbers of boys and girls in school. And in Pakistan, GPE provided funding for a distance-learning program that uses social media platforms, as well as radio, TV, and mobile phones, to keep students learning during the COVID-19 pandemic. The program may even help reach the 19 million children who were not attending school before the pandemic.

Rather than implementing projects itself in a given country, GPE brings together stakeholders from the public and private sectors around a national education plan; it also channels funding from private donors and governments to help finance those plans. Each country's plan is tailored to its specific needs and aligned with the local education plan supported by the government. In turn, partner countries are encouraged to allocate 20 percent of their domestic budget to education. Ultimately, GPE's goal is for local governments to take responsibility for fully funding a plan that delivers 12 years of schooling, plus a year of preschool, to every girl and boy.

GPE works with organizations and governments in 76 countries, many of them in sub-Saharan Africa. Funding is issued to governments through grant agents, which range from UN agencies, to NGOs, to global and regional development banks. The European Union, the United States, and other countries contribute funds to GPE. Since its founding in 2002, the organization has raised nearly \$11 billion to improve educational outcomes around the world.

Rotary's partnership with GPE will help Rotarians join the conversation at national levels, where GPE has contacts, and integrate their projects into a country's broader educational efforts. In turn, Rotary members can mobilize their extensive networks in areas that can be difficult for other organizations to reach. "Rotary will be a key partner, given its strong role in the local community and experience in community outreach," says Aparna Krishnamurthy, private sector and foundations specialist for GPE.

In the early stages of the partnership, Rotary hopes to engage members in three to five countries that are already part of the GPE network. Activities will differ depending on the specific needs within each country. Mary Jo Jean-Francois, Rotary International's area of focus manager for basic education and literacy, says Rotarians could play a key role, for instance, in helping families understand what educational resources from

GPE are available to their communities, and in conveying to governments what kind of educational assistance those communities need most. "This partnership gives Rotarians a seat at the table to not only voice concerns about what might be happening within education," Jean-Francois says, "but also to understand the policies around education and bring those back to the community."

Rotary members have already participated in meetings with officials from the ministries of education and other private-sector partners in Ghana, Kenya, and Zimbabwe. In those countries, Rotarians will take part in the Girls' Education Awareness Program, a GPE initiative that will use messaging campaigns to help break down social barriers to educating girls, such as early marriage and favoritism within families for boys over girls when it comes to education (girls are 1.5 times more likely than boys to be excluded from primary school). The program will be guided by each country's ministry of education and will complement existing strategies. "Rotarians at the consultations noted the importance of a strong community-based approach," Krishnamurthy says, "and shared examples of various partnerships they have forged with local community leaders in areas that are hardest to reach."

GPE held a global education summit 28-29 July as part of its effort to raise \$5 billion to support children in up to 90 countries and territories over the next five years. The organization plans to use this funding to ensure that 175 million boys and girls can learn, to enroll 88 million more children in school, and to train 2.2 million teachers. The summit included both virtual and in-person events in the United Kingdom and was co-hosted by British Prime Minister Boris Johnson and Kenyan President Uhuru Kenyatta. The funding campaign, called Raise Your Hand, garnered support from world leaders and celebrities, including former U.S. first lady Michelle Obama, international soccer star Didier Drogba, and supermodel Naomi Campbell.

- More than **48 million textbooks** were distributed and **4,115 classrooms** were built or rehabilitated with GPE funding in fiscal year 2019.
- GPE grants funded the training of nearly **1.6 million** teachers between 2016 and 2020.
- **Primary enrollment for girls** increased by 65 percent in GPE partner countries between 2002 and 2018.

Straight from the Horse's Mouth

GOOD GOVERNANCE PERSONIFIED. "It does not matter if the cat is black or white — what is important is that it catches mice." — Deng Xiaoping

There is always a special niche for an upright bureaucrat, a man of good will even in the most corrupt of systems; in the darkness, he who holds a candle is always needed. CESAR ENRIQUE AGUINALDO VIRATA, who served as a Finance and Prime Minister under President Ferdinand Marcos in an era considered as both the best and worst times for the Philippine economy, was one of a handful of top officials under the Marcos regime whose reputations have remained unsullied to this day.

Cesar Virata is the quintessential Filipino technocrat. An achiever even as a student, He holds two Bachelor of Science degrees, in Mechanical Engineering and Business Administration, which he completed with honors (cum laude) at the University of the Philippines in 1952. In 1953, he earned his MBA in Industrial Management from the University of Pennsylvania.



His career started unassumingly in the sheltered confines of the academe, at the University of the Philippines where he taught from 1952 and eventually became the youngest Dean of the College of Business Administration in 1969 at the age of 30 years old. Simultaneous with his full-time teaching load, he prodigiously developed the practice of business consultancy of the accounting firm of SyCip, Gorres, Velayo & Company, which led to the establishment of its Management Services Division.

In 1967, government took notice of his growing reputation and expertise and was appointed Deputy Director-General for Investments of the Presidential Economic Staff. This led to a string of appointments, first as Undersecretary for Industry at the Department of Commerce and Industry (1967-1968), then as Chairman of the Board of Investments (1968-1970), Secretary/Minister of Finance (1970-1986), Chairman, Development Committee and Consultative Group for External Assistance from the World Bank and International Monetary Fund and the Asian Development Bank (1976-1980), among others.

His public service career was tested by tumultuous shocks and demand development problems — the energy crisis of the 1970s, aggravated by currency and interest rate changes. In the midst of very challenging times, he helped to steer major investment, financial, banking, tax and budgetary reforms for the government. Mr. Virata inherited a department weak in technical expertise, a weakness he was able to remedy in his long

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tenure in that position, the longest in the country's history. He also embarked on a major cleanup of the Bureau of Internal Revenues and Customs, dismissing some 5,000 officials over the years, including some politically well-connected staff. There was an urgent need to put the fiscal house in order while seeking as well international assistance for the country's development efforts, leading to the Consultative Group coordinated by the World Bank. He saw in the Consultative Group a vehicle for breaking the policy gridlock and moving institutional reforms forward to streamline the agencies and minimize corruption.

Realizing the pitfalls in the Investment Incentives Law, he wanted to accelerate the liberalization of industry and trade. To help in this pursuit he recommended to President Marcos the appointment in 1970 of Gerardo Sicat, a UP professor of economics with a PhD from MIT (Cambridge, Massachusetts), to head the National Economic Council that was later to become the National Economic Development Authority (NEDA).

He was also responsible for the reform of commercial banking which was no less challenging than the industrial and trade policy reforms. The martial law setting would help accelerate the reforms in the domestic banking sector, leading to the merger of banks, increased capitalization, foreign participation, and stronger competition in the sector. Reforms extended to the Land Bank, which is now the largest formal credit institution in rural areas.

He served as an elected Member of the Batasan Pambansa (Parliament) from 1978 to 1986, the last five years of which, as Prime

Minister of the Republic of the Philippines (1981-1986). As Finance Secretary, Mr. Virata actively participated in and passionately pushed for the ratification of the Philippines-Japan Treaty of Amity, Commerce and Navigation in 1976. This landmark agreement not only normalized postwar trade relations between the Philippines and Japan were finally established.

Throughout his 34 years of outstanding government service, Prime Minister Virata developed a reputation for unsullied integrity, shining competence and sterling performance. It is a well-known fact that during the Philippines' most turbulent crises of the 1970's to the mid-1980's, it was the reputation of Prime Minister Virata, which allowed the country continued access to international finance and recognition by the world business and banking community.

Though retired from public service in 1986, the former Prime Minister Virata continued to keep an extremely active schedule through his involvement in various business and civic organizations. He is also involved in many other charitable, educational, business, historical foundations.

In 2014, the University of the Philippines made the unprecedented move to rename the College of Business Administration after him — the Cesar E.A. Virata School of Business (VSB) — where he served as Dean from 1960 to 1967. As an alumnus of the college, I had the extraordinary honor of being invited to personally witness the unveiling of a market commemorating this name change.

I have always been fascinated of Mr. Virata's accomplishments since my halcyon days as a university student. But I grew to admire him more when I got to meet him in a number of occasions. Aware of his lofty positions in government during the Marcos regime, I expected him to be aloof and magisterial. Much to my surprise, I found him to be a regular, unassuming, and gentle human being. Over the years since, I have felt more at ease with him not only in social gatherings but also in more formal occasions.

Having engaged with him in many of our casual conversations made me better appreciate the real Cesar Virata and the reforms he initiated which laid the groundwork for later reforms that have largely benefited the economy. It also made me understand why he stuck it out in public service during the much-disdained martial law regime. Even 91 years old, he remains a hard-wired optimist, it seems, doggedly hoping that his work on national policy and international economic diplomacy under those difficult circumstances will make a long-run difference.
